The song, ***The Galway Piper***, refers to playing bagpipes in the city of Galway, Ireland. Irish bagpipes are usually smaller and more difficult to play than the better-known Scottish bagpipes. It is said that “it takes 7 years to learn, 7 years to practice, and 7 years to play” before a piper is considered an expert.
