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
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Maps continue to change as people learn more about the world God created. Years ago, people explored new places and drew maps to show others what they had seen. They drew these early maps from memory. These maps were not always exactly right. Cameras and computers changed the way people make and use maps. Some maps are of something large, like a state or country. Other maps focus on smaller places, such as a mall or museum. Map keys tell the meaning of symbols on maps. All maps help people find the location of places they want to visit.



Springfield, Illinois

Springfield is the capital city of Illinois. How would you go about finding this city? First, look at the map of the United States. Find the compass rose, and review the cardinal directions. You will see that Illinois is south of Lake Michigan. It is east of the Mississippi River. Notice that the state of Wisconsin is to the north of Illinois. Indiana is to the east.



Now, find the city of Springfield on the state map. Remember, capital cities are marked with a star. You have learned other ways to find cities, too. Look at the letters and numbers on the top and side of the map. Springfield is located at **C4**. You can also find the city by looking at the lines of latitude and longitude. Springfield is located near 40 degrees north latitude and 90 degrees west longitude.


City Streets

You have found the city of Springfield. Now, let's look at it more closely. You will need a city map. Many cities in the United States are located in square blocks. These square blocks make it easier for people to find their way around a city. The city of Springfield, Illinois, is organized around square blocks.

Abraham Lincoln lived in Springfield, Illinois. He was one of America's most famous presidents. President Lincoln guided the country through the Civil War. He also worked to save the Union and end slavery. Look at the city map of Springfield. You will notice that many places are named for President Lincoln. These places include the Lincoln Home, the Lincoln Library, and the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library.

You will also see the streets of Springfield are named for U.S. presidents. These streets include Adams, Monroe, Jefferson,

and Washington Streets. The street names of a city often tell you something about its history. The **founders** of a city sometimes name streets after people they respect, like U.S. presidents. Streets can also be named for well-known citizens of the town. Look at a map of your city. See if you can find any streets named for famous people.



| Symbols on a city map

Symbols on City Maps

The symbols on a city map are like those on state and national maps. City maps also include some symbols for certain buildings. Earlier, you learned the symbols for interstates, hospitals, and places to eat. You will see these symbols on the map of Springfield. You will notice that the symbol for a hospital on this map is red 🛨 rather than blue. Remember, maps sometimes use different colors or symbols. Always be sure to study the key before reading a map.

Museums or **historical** sites are often shown by a m symbol. Concerts and theater shows might be performed in music centers. On some maps, these buildings are marked with a musical symbol of one or two notes 📭. Most large cities have airports and train stations. People often need to find these places. Train stations are shown with the symbol \square . Airports have the symbol of a plane \blacksquare .



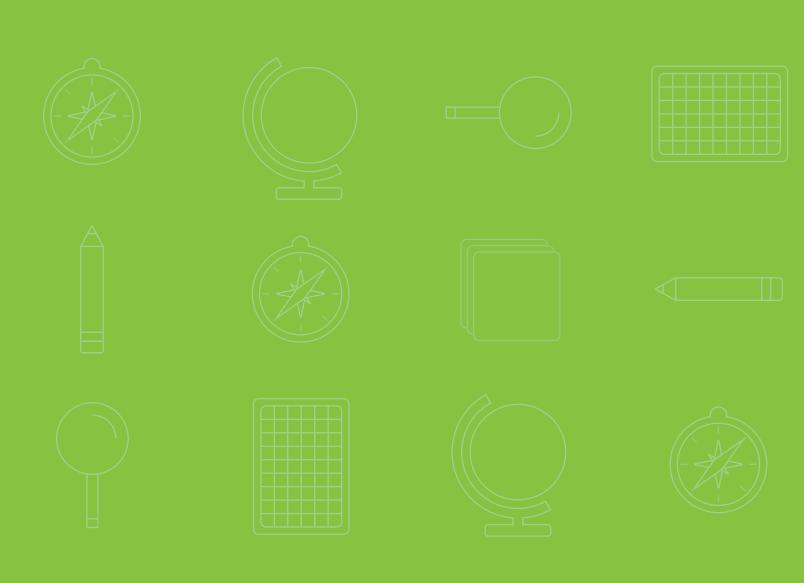
