QUESTIONS FROM THE READINGS

- 1. King James had two sons: Henry and Charles. Since Henry was the older son, he should have been the one to inherit James' throne. Why didn't he?
- 2. King James wanted Prince Charles to marry a princess from Spain. What was her name?
- 3. When that princess turned him down, Charles married a princess from France instead. What was her name?
- 4. Both King James and his son, King Charles I, believed that God gave kings the right to rule. What is this idea called?
- 5. About 15,000 20,000 Puritans moved to New England between 1630 1640. Other Puritans moved to other places. What is this big movement of Puritans called?
- 6. John Winthrop preached a famous sermon on his way across the Atlantic. What did he call this sermon?
- 7. Winthrop settled his people around a fine harbor between Salem and Plymouth, Massachusetts. What harbor?
- 8. The Church of England got a tough new leader in 1633. Who was he?
- 9. This leader didn't want ministers preaching from the Bible. Instead, he wanted all ministers to follow the services in a certain book. What book?
- 10. A Scot called Jenny Geddes didn't like her minister reading from this book. How did she let her minister know?
- 11. After ruling on his own for eleven years, King Charles I finally called a new parliament in 1640. What was this first new parliament called?
- 12. Later that same year, King Charles I called a second new parliament. What was this one called?
- 13. The hardest-fighting troops of the English Civil War were a group called the Ironsides Cavalry. Who led the Ironsides Cavalry?
