





They provide homes for thousands of species of plants and animals.

Some Common Types of Wetlands

Bog—a wet, spongy area of standing water where plants such as sphagnum moss grow.


Marsh—an area that is covered with shallow water where plants such as grasses, reeds, and sedges grow.

Swamp—an area that is covered with shallow water where certain shrubs or trees grow.

Vernal Pool—an area that is covered with water for part of the year and is dry the rest of the year.
