

Family Secret: The History of Canning

When Andi bursts into the house, she finds the kitchen filled with apples, sugar, and canning jars. Mother, Nila, and Luisa have been busy canning (preserving) the sweet applesauce that is made from the apples.

During the time Andi lived (1880s), families were beginning to benefit from new inventions like the telegraph and the harvester. However, there were many things we take for granted today that Andi did not have. The refrigerator had not yet been invented. Instead, her family used an ice box to store foods that spoil, like milk and meat. A large block of ice was kept in an insulated cabinet. A spring house or a cool cellar stored butter, cheese, and vegetables. Food was also stored by either drying (like beef jerky) or salting the meat to keep it from spoiling. In cold climates (not California), meat could be hung frozen in an outdoor building during the winter.

People knew how to preserve foods to keep themselves from getting sick, but they did not understand *why* it worked. No one knew much about bacteria—the microscopic organisms that spoil food and make people ill.

In 1860, John Mason invented a glass jar with a seal and a reusable metal lid. It became known as the Mason jar. In 1873, a lady named Amanda Jones thought more about the canning process. She wanted to find a way to remove the air that sometimes got trapped in the jars, which caused the food to spoil. She filled the extra spaces with juice. This added more flavor, kept the nutrition intact, and kept bacteria from growing from lack of oxygen (no air).

People had to boil things for a long time in order to kill the germs and keep the food inside the jar from spoiling. Imagine doing that on a wood cookstove in August in California. Hot does not even begin to describe an 1800s kitchen during a busy canning season.

Just for Fun: Make Applesauce

Andi happens uponan afternoon of applesauce making, and she probably wishes she'd never come home from the creek. Apples in California are harvested from mid-August through October depending on the variety, so Andi had already had her hand in helping with some of the earlier apple harvesting that summer.

Applesauce is an easy treat to make at home. Applesauce you make yourself tastes a lot better than applesauce you buy in a jar at the supermarket. You will need parental supervision for this activity, however,

Homemade Applesauce

<u>Warning</u>: Boiling apples are hot and sometimes "pop" out at you, so be on your guard while making this recipe.

This recipe makes chunky applesauce, the kind you can make without a fancy food mill (which turns the apples into the consistency of baby food).

- 3 to 4 pounds of peeled, cored, and quartered apples. Choose a good cooking apple like Gravenstein, Granny Smith, Jonathan, or McIntosh.
- 1 small cinnamon stick
- 1 tablespoon of lemon juice (It helps bring out the flavor of the apples.)
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons to 1/4 cup white sugar to taste
- 1 cup water

Put all the ingredients together in a large, heavy pot. Bring to a boil, stirring when necessary to keep from burning. Reduce heat and cover. Simmer 15 to 20 minutes or until apples are soft. Stir often. Remove from heat, take out the cinnamon stick, and mash everything with a potato masher.

Serve warm or chilled. Homemade applesauce keeps up to a week in the refrigerator and up to a year in the freezer.



Family Secret: Stagecoach Robbers

Andi is not excited to learn that her new brother-in-law is a stagecoach robber. What is a stagecoach, and why would someone rob it? The picture to the right shows a typical stagecoach of the 1800s. They were the main means of traveling from place to place, especially before the railroads crisscrossed the country. Stagecoaches traveled specific routes, much like busses today, and followed timetables.





Stagecoach robbers (also known as highwaymen or road agents) were after the Wells Fargo strongbox each stage carried. This box contained gold and money and weighed 150 pounds or more. The bandits were also happy to relieve passengers of their valuables.

One of the places where stagecoaches were often robbed was along the route to the Yosemite Valley in the Sierra Nevada range. Yosemite National Park is in east-central California and is our nation's first national park. But in 1880, Yosemite was not a national park. It was a rugged, beautiful mountain region. It didn't take long for word to get around about the area's wild charm. The Yosemite Valley and the Mariposa Grove (where the largest trees in the world—the giant sequoias—grow) became destinations for tourists.

In 1877, the new Yosemite Stage and Turnpike Company began offering trips to Yosemite for \$45 round trip. This was an expensive trip if you consider the average person earned about a dollar a day. Only rich folks could afford these early trips. They boarded the stagecoach in Madera (twenty miles north of Fresno) and braved the narrow, steep, mountainous roads. Because the wealthy were on these stages, it didn't take robbers long to figure out they were easy targets.

The robbers held up the stage in the middle of nowhere and demanded the strongbox. They also took watches, rings, money, and even buttons.

You would think these reports about robberies would scare visitors away, but in an odd way they were looked on as romantic, especially by the ladies. While the male passengers were on the alert, prepared for some kind of terrible confrontation, the women took it differently. One lady asked, "Do you think they will rob us this trip?" "Oh, no, madam," came the stationmaster's reply. "There is no danger at all." "Oh," the lady said, downcast. "I do wish they would!"

The idea of a romantic encounter with a real live robber in the dark forests of a mountain road added excitement to the women's otherwise monotonous daily lives.



Travel in the 1880s: Stagecoaches

Traveling by stagecoach was not a pleasant experience. The song below sounds funny, but it's a good description of the hardships involved when riding the stage. The coaches were sturdily built. They had to be in order to survive the different terrains. The most famous type of stagecoach was the Concord. It was built in Concord, New Hampshire, and came in three sizes for six, nine, or twelve passengers. In a pinch, the driver might squeeze twenty passengers inside. Six more passengers could be loaded on the roof. The brightly painted coach was pulled by a team of four or six perfectly matched horses.

What a sight they were! The stage usually roared into town at a mad gallop, the driver cracking his whip over his horses' heads. These drivers were looked up to. They reminded folks of Roman chariot drivers. Not many men could handle the six-horse team in the dark, through a blizzard, along narrow trails over the mountains, beside the edge of a ravine, or through a sandy desert.


California saw its share of famous, gutsy stagecoach drivers, but none was more famous than Charley Parkhurst. Charley was a capable driver and good with a gun if the need arose. The most amazing thing about this driver, however, was the discovery that was made after Charley's death. He was a she, Mary Parkhurst, who had run away from an orphanage at age twelve disguised as a boy and kept up her deception until she died. She drove stagecoaches during the gold rush, retired, ranched some, and then died in 1879.


Family Secret: Design a Stagecoach

The Concord was a custom-made stagecoach. Each one was made to order for the customer, who was paying between \$1,000 and \$1,500 for the brightly painted vehicle. Favorite customer colors included red, green, or yellow for the body, with yellow or red wheels, spokes, and running gear. The doors were painted with special nature scenes, and stripes and scroll designs were also applied. Wells Fargo was the Concord's biggest customer, although hotels bought stages to carry guests back and forth from the railroad station.

A Concord coach was tall and wide and individually numbered. Each weighed about 2,500 pounds. The big wheels had spokes long enough to get the stagecoach through muddy, rutted roads. Leather flaps could be lowered over the windows to keep out the dust, rain, or cold.

Travel in the 1880s: Stagecoaches

Gather 'round, travelers! Next time you climb aboard a stagecoach, these travel tips might come in handy. Read the following instructions. Then circle the tips you found the most surprising, that made you say, "You've got to be kidding! They really did this?"

Tips for the Stagecoach Traveler

("Making the Trip Bearable" from the *Omaha Herald* newspaper, 1877)

- The best seat inside the coach is the one next to the driver. You will get less than half the bumps and jars than on any other seat. If some "nice" gent offers you the middle or back seat, don't take it!
- When the driver asks you to get out and walk . . . do it. If the team runs away, sit tight and take your chances. If you jump out, you will get hurt.
- Don't growl at the food stations. The stage company provides the best they can get.
- Don't keep the stage waiting.
- Don't smoke a strong pipe inside, especially early in the morning. Spit on the leeward side (the side protected from the wind) of the stage. If you have anything in a bottle to take, pass it around.
- Don't swear.
- Don't lean over your neighbor when sleeping.
 - Don't ask how far it is to the next station until you get there.
 - *Never* attempt to fire a gun or pistol while on the road. It may frighten the horses. Also, the careless handling and cocking of the weapon make your fellow travelers nervous.

- Don't discuss religion or politics.
- Don't point out places on the road where horrible murders have been committed.
- Don't grease your hair before setting out. Dust will stick to it enough to make it look like a potato patch.
- Don't imagine for a moment that you are on a picnic. Expect annoyance, discomfort, and hardships.






