# **Schedules**

### SEMESTER SCHEDULE

For most students, Hewitt recommends a semester for each Lightning Literature guide. (This is how Hewitt's English and Honors English programs are run.)

This schedule does not include any of the optional reading. (For example, such things as the introductions to the texts.) This schedule allows for two papers for each book-length work and one paper for each shorter work. (These are the paper requirements for students enrolled in Hewitt.) If you wish to alter this, you may need to alter the schedule accordingly.

You may want to answer the Comprehension Questions more frequently than once a week, possibly even as often as daily. How often you answer them is up to you. This schedule assumes an 18-week semester. It does not state where those weeks fall (for example, it does not start on September first, show a week's break for Christmas, etc.), it simply numbers the weeks. You can insert any breaks wherever they fit best for you and your family.

Note that when your first quarter ends (after nine weeks) you will be behind in this class. Don't worry. The first book is very long, but rather than rush through the book I believe it is better if you take your time. The last two books of the course are quite short, and you will make up the time then. If you are enrolled with Hewitt, simply delay sending in the first quarter until you have completed all your work. (Or you can submit all your other work and follow up later with your English when you have completed it. Or you can submit some of your English work with your other first quarter work with a note stating that the rest will follow later.)

- Complete the Comprehension Questions.
- Read "Regionalism and Realism" and "Poems About Stories, People, and Places" which follow the lesson.

- Choose one exercise from "Writing Exercises" for Unit 1, Lesson 2, and write at least a rough draft of this paper.
- Read all of Unit 2, Lesson 3 ("Bret Harte"): Introduction, the story, and the Literary Lesson ("Local Color").
- Complete the Comprehension Questions.

### WEEK 8

- Review and make any necessary revisions to your paper for Unit 1, Lesson 2.
- Choose one exercise from "Writing Exercises" for Unit 2, Lesson 3, and write at least a rough draft of this paper.
- Read the Introduction to Unit 2, Lesson 4 ("Mark Twain").
- Read chapters 1–10 of *Huck Finn* and answer the Comprehension Questions.

- Read all of Unit 3, Lesson 5 ("Paul Laurence Dunbar"): Introduction, the poems, and the Literary Lesson ("Register").
- If you have trouble understanding any of the poems, rewrite them in prose form.
- Complete the Comprehension Questions.
- Read "Realism and Naturalism" which follows the lesson.

- Review your six papers for Units 1 and 2, making all necessary changes. If you are enrolled with Hewitt, submit these six papers and your other requirements for this quarter. (Remember, though this quarter is ending late, you'll make up the time in your last quarter.)
- Choose an exercise from "Writing Exercises" for Unit 3, Lesson 5, and write at least a rough draft of this paper.
- Read the Introduction to Unit 3, Lesson 6 ("Stephen Crane").
- Read chapters 1–12 of *The Red Badge of Courage* and answer the Comprehension Questions.

### **WEEK 13**

- Review and make any necessary revisions to your paper for Unit 3, Lesson 5.
- Read chapters 13–24 of *The Red Badge of Courage* and answer the Comprehension Ouestions.
- Read the Literary Lesson ("Description") for Unit 3, Lesson 6.
- Choose one writing exercise for Unit 3, Lesson 6, and write at least a rough draft of your paper.
- Read "Copying" which follows the lesson

- Review and make any necessary revisions to your first paper for Unit 3, Lesson 6.
- Choose another writing exercise for Unit 3, Lesson 6, and write at least a rough draft of your paper.
- Read all of Unit 4, Lesson 7 ("Emily Dickinson"): Introduction, the poems, and the Literary Lesson ("Figurative Language").
- If you have trouble understanding any of the poems, rewrite them in prose form.
- Complete the Comprehension Questions.

- Choose an exercise from "Writing Exercises" for Unit 4, Lesson 7 and write at least a rough draft of this paper.
- Read the Introduction to Unit 4, Lesson 8 ("Jack London").
- Read chapters 1–2 of *The Call of the Wild* and answer the Comprehension Questions.

- Review and make any necessary revisions to your paper for Unit 4, Lesson 7.
- Read chapters 3–7 of *The Call of the Wild* and answer the Comprehension Questions.
- Read the Literary Lesson ("Point of View") for Unit 4, Lesson 8.
- Choose one exercise from "Writing Exercises" for Unit 4, Lesson 8, and write at least a rough draft of this paper.

### **WEEK 18**

 Review your six papers for Units 3 and 4, making all necessary changes. If you are enrolled with Hewitt, submit these six papers and your other requirements for this quarter.

# FULL-YEAR SCHEDULE

Although Hewitt recommends a semester for each Lightning Literature guide, students who struggle in language arts may wish to take a whole year for one guide, while supplementing with separate grammar work and/or other language arts materials. (This is how Hewitt's Basic English program is run.)

This schedule does not include any of the optional reading. (For example, such things as the introductions to the texts.) This schedule allows for two papers for each book-length work and one paper for each shorter work. (These are the paper requirements for students enrolled in Hewitt.) If you wish to alter this, you may need to alter the schedule accordingly.

You may want to answer the Comprehension Questions more frequently than once a week, possibly even as often as daily. How often you answer them is up to you. This schedule assumes a 36-week year. It does not state where those weeks fall (for example, it does not start on September first, show a week's break for Christmas, etc.), it simply numbers the weeks. You can insert any breaks wherever they fit best for you and your family.

Note that when your first quarter ends (after nine weeks) you will be behind in this class. You will still be behind at the end of your second quarter (after 18 weeks) Don't worry. The first book is very long, but rather than rush through the book I believe it is better if you take your time. The last two books of the year are quite short, and you will make up the time then. If you are enrolled with Hewitt, simply delay sending in these quarters until you have completed all your work.

One final note: Weeks 2–4 are quite heavy with reading. You may wish to put aside or greatly decrease your work in grammar, vocabulary, etc., for those weeks. The following week (5) and week 9 are light with reading, and you can make up the work in these other areas during those weeks. Also, weeks 31–33 are extremely light in reading, so if you get behind on anything else these weeks should give you some breathing room.
