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# LESSON 4: The Tarquins (616-510 B.C.)

#### **FACTS TO KNOW**

- 1. King Ancus Marcius fourth king; built the harbor city Ostia
- 2. King Tarquin Lucumo; built the Capitol, Temple of Jupiter, Circus
- 3. Tanaquil wife of Tarquin; thought gods made Tarquin king
- **4. seven-hilled city** a nickname for Rome
- **5. Circus Maximus** racetrack built by Tarquin; could seat 250,000
- **6. King Servius Tullius** son-in-law of Tarquin; first to take census
- 7. King Tarquin Superbus Tarquin the Proud; killed Servius; last monarch
- 8. Sibylline Books the "holy books" (ritual books) of the Romans
- 9. Ostia harbor and port of Rome at the mouth of the Tiber; means "mouths" in Latin

	Tarquin built the Temple of Jupiter on the Capitoline Hill.

	Rome, and built Rome's first true wall.
5.	Describe the character of Tarquin Superbus. What did he bring to Rome?  Tarquin Superbus was arrogant and cruel. He brought the three Sibylline books to Rome.
6.	What events took place in the Circus Maximus and in the Forum?  The Circus Maximus held horse races, games, and shows of various kinds. Public
	meetings were held at the Forum, which was located at the foot of Capitoline Hill. The
	Forum had a large speaker's platform with statues of prominent and famous Romans.
	The Forum contained all the major monumental buildings for public business, such as
	temples, law courts, and assembly halls. Note: Today the word "forum" is used to mea
	a gathering for discussion and exchange of ideas.

#### **ACTIVITIES KEY**


- 1. Capitol is the building where a legislative body meets. Capital is the seat of government of a nation or state. Capital also means money used to fund a business. Caput is the Latin word for "head."
- 2. The fasces is an ax enclosed in a bundle of rods tied with a strap. It was a symbol of authority; the ax indicated that the king could order criminals to be beheaded and rods meant he could punish offenders by flogging (beating). The fasces, then, symbolized civil authority.

  Note: Mussolini reinstated the fasces as a symbol of his regime. This is the origin of the term "fascism."


