Revive the art of written correspondence with one of our 16 styles of antique postcards!

Postcards are made to go through the mail without envelopes. They originated in the late 1800's. Proper postcard etiquette says that on the divided back of a postcard, the address goes on the right side and the message on the left.

Our postcards are perfect for practicing penmanship and fine motor skills. Use pens, pencils, markers or crayons to write messages!

Ideas: Make practicing personal details fun by asking students to practice their home address and phone number on these beautiful postcards.

Some of our postcards are from other countries! Ask students to pretend they are vacationing in one of those countries. Students can write a postcard with imaginary details to a pen pal, grandparent or friend.

These postcards are perfect for dramatic play. Students can write messages to each other in invisible ink (lemon juice) or in secret codes of their own devising! To reveal the secret message, hold the postcard up to a light bulb!



Create "get to know me" crafts using an antique postcard and a student photo. Ask students to glue their photo to the front of a postcard, decorate the postcard and write a short message about themselves. These can be displayed on a bulletin board or used in pairs as an ice-breaker activity.

Explore the culture of the countries represented by the postcards. Decorate the front of the postcard with scenes or designs from that country.
