

Introduction

In history, we learn about times, places, and people. So it only makes sense to study geography alongside history. Geography covers the "places" part. Each aspect of historical study is important in its own right, but they cannot be studied exclusively of one another. For example, when you study Alexander the Great, it only makes sense to see the large land area that he conquered by looking at a map. Modern maps will not give you the same information or perspective as historical maps do.

This book was created to provide you with the most usable yet attractive historical map book possible. Within these pages, you will find a full-color historical atlas. The teacher may decide whether to provide this map collection to the students or have students research specific places on their own using a globe, wall map, internet search, or another historical atlas.

The maps can be used by learners at various ages. Firstly, for students in grades 1 to 4, map work should be fun and interactive, not a test or drill. However, if you have a kindergarten student who is ready for a little challenge or a 5th grader that needs some extra assistance, adjust to suit your students' needs. Also, with this age group, the teacher should be willing to help with spelling or writing if the child needs some help on the maps. Secondly, for student in grades 5 through 8, you will find kids ready for additional challenges and are capable of more writing/recording than the younger kids. And finally, for students in grades 9 to 12, you will find they can complete more challenging assignments. They can be assigned to do selected research of time periods, specific countries, or areas.



The maps in this book will enhance your student's interest and understanding of history and geography, as well as other topics of invention, music, development of civilizations, points of interest, and more. By using maps, instructors will enable students to:

- Develop critical thinking skills
- § Understand a large amount of information presented in a compact form
- § Increase interest and engagement with the material whether teacher-led or independent study
- § Modify the material per student interest and abilities
- Quickly make connections between what they have read and its impact in the real world
- § Integrate map reading or map development into a variety of courses
- § Learn to use spatial skills in relation to scale and distance
- Process mental mapping and visualization skills

This unique atlas is a resource you will return to again and again!


Using this Map Trek Atlas

This book was created to provide historical glimpses of the world through geographical locations and events captured in time. This might include a personal study of Israel's golden age, found in the Ancient

World maps, or a study of the Hundred Years' War, found in the Medieval World maps, or an examination of World Empires (1900s), found in the Modern World maps. So, this atlas can be an educational tool to help you see how the world has changed over time, from Creation to the present and thus be used with almost any history curriculum you prefer.

Expanding your studies

A resource that was developed alongside this atlas is the *Map Trek Outlines* book. It contains blank maps on perforated pages that can be used by students for additional coursework or drawing exercises. Students can write down important geographical landmarks, including mountains, rivers, and cities, as well as significant battle sites, journeys, and more. The maps can also be used as reviews or as tests to assess knowledge of the history of the world.
