

How to Use this Dictionary

The *Spelling Dictionary* is an integral part of the Horizons Spelling Program and accomplishes several purposes:

- 1. Students will become acquainted with the format and function of a simple dictionary.
- 2. Students will learn the function of guide words and diacritical markings.
- 3. Students will be able to see and read their spelling words within the context of a sentence.
- 4. Students will have an opportunity to practice their alphabetizing and reading/writing skills by using the *Spelling Dictionary* to perform the following tasks:
 - Look up the spelling words at the beginning of each week's lessons.
 - Record their weekly "Working Words" in the appropriate locations at the back of the Spelling Dictionary.
 - Use the Spelling Dictionary as a resource for writing sentences and stories.

Parts of speech are identified, and plural and comparative forms of words are also shown.

ant (ant) n. small insect

The teacher stopped to help <u>each</u> child.

early (er le) adv. near the start of something

We have to get up very <u>early</u> tomorrow.

earth (erth) n. the world, the planet on which we live

God made the heavens and the earth.

eighteen $(\bar{a}' t \bar{e} n') n$. the number between 17 and 19

Bob's brother, Jim, will be <u>eighteen</u> in June.

eighth (ātth) adj. thing coming after the 7th in a series

Sally will be in the <u>eighth</u> grade next year.

eighty $(\bar{a}' t\bar{e}) n$. number eight times ten

Jake's grandma just turned eighty.

elephant (el ə fənt) n. a very large animal with

thick, gray skin, tusks, and a long trunk

That <u>elephant</u> has very long tusks.

strong • supper

strong (strông) adj. powerful

The rope that held the boat in place was strong.

stronger (strông gər) adj. comparative of strong

Rope is stronger than string.

strongest (strông gəst) adj. superlative of strong

Greg is the strongest person I know.

such (such) adj. of a certain kind

That was <u>such</u> a nice picnic.

summer (sum or) n. the warm season of the year

I can't wait for summer!

Sunday (sun de) n. the first day of the week

We went to church on <u>Sunday</u>.

sung (sung) v. past participle of sing

I did not know the song that was sung last night.

supper (sup ər) n. the last meal of the day; the evening meal

We had roast chicken for supper last night.

winter (win tər) n. the cold season of

the year

We will go sledding this winter.

wish (wish) n. a desire or hope for something

Make a wish before you blow out the candles!

v. to want or desire something

I wish that I could go see Grandma this week.

wish, wishes, wishing, wished

wishes (wish əz) n. plural of wish

How many wishes did you make?

without (with out') preposition. not having something; free from

Jill left without her umbrella.

wonderful (wun der fel) adj. amazing

The party was a wonderful surprise.

won't (wont) contraction. will not

Nate said that he won't be able to drive us to the

game.

wood (wud) n. material from trees used for building and for

fires

Tom gathered wood for the fire.

wool (wil) n. soft, curly hair of sheep and

some other animals

The sheep had thick, soft wool.
