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
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
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How To Use This Book

Take a moment to review how to effectively utilize this book below. *Foundational Truths* is structured into 52 weekly lessons, aiming to equip you to live a deeper life with God every single day. It is versatile and can be used by individuals, families, study groups, and more. The primary goal is to impart the fundamental teachings of God's Word through a question-and-answer format. Each week:





Introduction

God knows you. He wants you to know Him. Do you? Do you really know Him... and the kind of relationship He wants with you?

Think of this book like a personal Q&A with God. Delve into this modern non-denominational catechism (the part concerning questions and answers about God and the Bible). You'll find some very important things for you to understand in His Word.

Can you give God a few minutes a day? Maybe just a few minutes for:

- Your personal devotion time to restore your faith
- Enrichment of your children's understanding and responsibilities in being a part of God's family
- Giving God a small part of your day to realize His Work in your life

Let's look over a brief history of and foundation for learning to live from God's Word. Let these 52 weekly lessons prepare you to live a deeper life with God every single day.

In our modern church age, the term "catechism" sounds a bit strange and unfamiliar to most of us. What is a catechism, and how can it be useful for your family?

Webster's 1828 Dictionary defines "catechism" this way:

- A form of instruction by means of questions and answers, particularly in the principles of religion.
 - An elementary book containing a summary of principles in any science or art, but appropriately in religion, reduced to the form of questions and answers, and sometimes with notes, explanations, and references to authorities.

Asking questions can be a wonderful means of teaching.

In ancient Greece, the philosopher Socrates developed a teaching approach that involved asking critical thinking questions to his students that became known as "The Socratic method."

God asked many questions of people in the Bible. Jesus taught His disciples not merely by telling them what they should believe, but by asking them questions. (For more on this, see the books *Questions God Asks* and *Questions Jesus Asks*, by Israel Wayne, published by New Leaf Press.)



What Is Luther's Catechism?



Martin Luther, the founder of the Protestant Reformation, realized that it would be important not only for adults to read the Bible for themselves (in their own language) but for children to learn it as well. In 1529, Luther wrote a catechism for children.

Luther's Large Catechism (also called Book of Concord 1580) contained the Ten Commandments, the Apostles' Creed, the Lord's Prayer, the Sacrament of Holy Baptism, the Office of the Keys and Confession, and the Sacrament of the Lord's Table.

What Are Some Other Popular Catechisms?

Here are several historic catechisms that have been used and appreciated by the Christian church since the Protestant Reformation:

(A.D. 1549–1662)	The Anglican Catechism (Church of England)
(A.D. 1563)	The Heidelberg Catechism (Dutch Reformed Church / CRC)
(A.D. 1647)	Westminster Larger Catechism (Presbyterian: 196 questions)
(A.D. 1693)	Benjamin Keach's Catechism (The Baptist Catechism) (118 questions)

What Is the Purpose of a Catechism?

What are the benefits of a catechism? The Anglican (Church of England) Catechism (1549–1662) answers this question for us:



What dost thou chiefly learn in these Articles of thy Belief (the creed)?



First, I learn to believe in God the Father, who hath made me, and all the world.

Secondly, in God the Son, who hath redeemed me, and all mankind.

Thirdly, in God the Holy Ghost, who sanctifieth me, and all the elect people of God.

The purpose of questions provided in any catechism is ultimately to help us to know God. Jesus Himself affirmed this goal as being the most important pursuit of our life:

"And this is life eternal, that they might know thee the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom thou hast sent."



There is no substitute for the Bible. Creeds, confessions, and catechisms are not ever to be a replacement for the Bible. They are simply tools that can help Christians to understand, in a more systematic way, what the Bible teaches. If any of these tools are ever in disagreement with the Bible, they must be set aside in the same way we would dismiss a sermon by our own local church's pastor if it taught something that does not align with the Bible.

Why Do We Need All of These Other Resources? Isn't the Bible Sufficient?

The Bible is all we need for our salvation and our life in Christ. It alone is the living breath of God. But we are blessed today to have many other tools that may be helpful to us in our journey and growth as a Christian. If we do not find these tools to be useful, that's fine. We are not obligated to use them. But often we don't use things like catechisms because we simply don't know they exist or understand their purpose. Our goal in this resource is to point you back to the Word of God directly, in an organized and focused way.

The questions contained in this resource can be memorized if you wish by individuals, students, or by an entire family. You could take one question per week to commit to memory (feel free to shorten answers for young children). It is often helpful to recite the answers together, at least once daily, if you're doing this as a family. This strongly aids in memorizing the answers.



What Bible Translation Is Used in This Book?

For universal application, we chose the King James Version, but feel free to read and/or memorize the verses referenced in this resource in whatever Bible version your family prefers.



God's creation plainly reveals His wisdom (Ps. 19:1; Prov. 3:19) so we are without excuse (Rom. 1:18-20). Our moral conscience knows right and wrong, pointing to a moral lawgiver (God) (Rom. 2:14-15). The Scriptures are God's Word given to us by God revealing the way of salvation (1 Cor. 1:21-24; 2 Tim. 3:15).

"The heavens declare the glory of God; and the firmament sheweth his handywork." Psalm 19:1 "The LORD by wisdom hath founded the earth; by understanding hath he established the heavens." Proverbs 3:19 "For the wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness of men, who hold the truth in unrighteousness; Because that which may be known of God is manifest in them; for God hath shewed it unto them. For the invisible things of him from the creation of the Romans 1:18-20 world are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even his eternal power and Godhead; so that they are without excuse." "For when the Gentiles, which have not the law, do by nature the things contained in the law, these, having not the law, are a law unto themselves: Which shew the work of the law written in their hearts, their Romans 2:14-15 conscience also bearing witness, and their thoughts the mean while accusing or else excusing one another." "For after that in the wisdom of God the world by wisdom knew not God, it pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe. For the Jews require a sign, and the Greeks seek after wisdom: But we preach Christ crucified, unto the Jews 1 Corinthians 1:21-24 a stumbling block, and unto the Greeks foolishness; But unto them which are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God, and the wisdom of God." "And that from a child thou hast known the holy scriptures, which are able to make thee wise unto 2 Timothy 3:15 salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus."

FOUNDATIONAL TRUTH #1 We know God through creation and the Scriptures In Action

Strive this week to make your actions like those desired by God, found in the teachings of the Scriptures. Each day, identify an opportunity to act in a way that reflects God's wisdom and moral standards. This could involve acts of kindness, forgiveness, love, or seeking justice.

Definitions

Creation

Describes the universe, starting with Earth and all living things made by God in six days. God created the world and everything in it through His divine command, culminating in the creation of humanity in His image.

Unrighteousness

Signifies moral wrongdoing or actions that are opposite of the righteous and just standards set by God, often associated with sin and disobedience to God's commandments.

Wisdom

The ability to apply knowledge, understanding, and discernment in a way that aligns with God's truth and leads to righteous living and a deep relationship with God.

FOUNDATIONAL TRUTH #2 God is everlasting to everlasting In Action

Set aside time this week to consider incorporating daily prayer and contemplation on the nature of God's eternal existence, expressing gratitude and reverence for this understanding, and seeking to deepen your relationship with God each day.

Definitions

Everlasting

Something that lasts forever or has no end, often used to describe God's attributes or promises.

Existent

Currently exists or has reality or being.

Moses

A biblical figure and prophet who led the Israelites out of Egypt and received the Ten Commandments from God on Mount Sinai.

Variableness

The quality of being changeable or variable; inconstant nature or characteristics, often contrasted with God's unchanging and steadfast nature.

Consumed

Often refers to being wholly absorbed, engulfed, or burned up because of God's holiness.



In Action

Dedicate time this week for focused prayer and reflection on the Trinity and consciously apply this understanding in your daily life, living out the belief in one God existing as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and reflecting on their unity and equality in power and glory.

Definitions

Baptizing

Water baptism symbolizes the death, burial, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ and the new life found in Him

Proceedeth

To move forward, continue, or take action in a particular direction or manner.

Essence

The fundamental nature or being of God, comprising Father, Son (Jesus Christ), and Holy Spirit.

FOUNDATIONAL TRUTH #5 God knows about all things In Action Practice surrendering and trusting

God's knowledge this week. Keep a journal to jot down your thoughts, concerns, and experiences throughout the week. At the end of each day, write down moments when you felt God's guidance or saw evidence of His knowledge in your life. By consciously acknowledging and surrendering to the fact that God knows all things, and incorporating this awareness into your prayers, reflections, and actions, you can deepen your faith and trust in His wisdom and plan for your life.

Definitions

Condemn

To pronounce judgment or express disapproval of something based on moral or ethical standards, often associated with denouncing sinful actions or behavior.

Compassest

Conveys the idea that God surrounds, understands, and is intimately aware of every aspect of an individual's life.

Testify

To give a personal account or declaration of one's faith, beliefs, experiences, or knowledge.
