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Synonyms: Almost the Same

Synonyms are especially important when you decide your need a more exact word or a better word to express your meaning when you are writing or reading. At such times, a thesaurus is a helpful reference.

Because a thesaurus entry usually contains several words that are considered synonyms, you need to also use a dictionary to be sure that the word you choose produces the meaning you want. You cannot be sure that every word in the list will work as a substitute for the one you started with.

For example, if you want to describe a landscape that does not contain a lot of vegetation and other objects, you might think of the word *bare*, but that is not exactly what you mean. The thesaurus lists several words that could be used in place of *bare*: naked, simple, stark, nude, exposed, uncovered, undressed, stripped. Most of those do not seem to fit, but you are not sure about the word *stark*. When you look it up in the dictionary, you find that it means exactly what you had in mind: plain, unadorned.

Use a thesaurus and a dictionary to choose the best synonyms to replace the italicized words in the following sentences. (Remember that one word often leads to another.
